Education

We work with organisations, schools and community groups to provide practical ways to live and work more sustainably. We run workshops on everything from reducing waste, to gardening, to upcycling pallets into planter boxes to buzzing about bees. Last year, in lockdown we mastered webinars, this year we focused on helping others run events.

Recycling Programmes

We are Wellington's central drop-off point for e-waste, mobile phones, used bicycles, child car-seats, plastic lids, metal lids, used stationery and oral care products. We've also started collecting shavers and razors, small metal items, wool and yarn, food grade silicone and Bata gumboots.



Wellington Curtain Bank

We take donations of curtains and fabric from homes and businesses and upcycle them into made-to-measure, lined curtains for homes in need.



Warm Fuzzies and Well Homes

We give comprehensive support to vulnerable people and families with health concerns because of cold, damp housing. We are a key partner in the regional healthy housing programme, Well Homes.



Fair Energy

We advocate for strong local and regional policies that improve housing quality, reduce energy costs and develop programmes that alleviate energy hardship. We're also active members of the Community Energy Network and are a part of the Wellington Regional Healthy Housing Group.





We now take small metal items, Bata gumboots, oral care, stationery, razors, wool and silicone. Just getting one step closer to becoming a central city resource recovery centre.





With help from Wellington Community Trust, we put the wheels in motion to become an energy retailer on a mission to support vulnerable homes experiencing energy poverty.

Thanks to funding from the Ministry of Business Innovation and Employment, we were in a position to help even more low-income homes through the Well Homes / Warm Fuzzies Programme.





As a part of our commitment to #SupporLocal, we adopted Dope - a plant-based low waste food truck.

We opened up our whare to our friends from Kaicycle & GenZero - giving them free use of our central city location all year round.





We're officially Climate Positive, which means we offset 120% of our carbon emissions.

Thanks to funding from The Packaging Forum we now have a cardboard packaging perforator Eaton Cardboard. From now on, we will be able to send our items out in recycled and recyclable packaging.
