



In the last decade we've had a strong focus on the bottom-up stuff, addressing the symptoms of the issues faced by the community. For example, installing insulation in cold homes, or providing free, lined curtains to low-income families.

For example, to change the building code to ensure each new home built is insulated, ventilated and heated requires many years of consultation and technical input.

# This year's proudest moments

We've gone electric! First came the electric vehicle charger – installed for free by EV enthusiasts in our small carpark in Forresters Lane last year. Then came an electric bike, then finally an electric car. Electric vehicles are key to reducing Wellington's carbon footprint and we're proud to have started making the change in our own organisation.





We were delighted to be recognised at the Sustainable Business Network Awards in November. The Trust won the **Airbnb Community Impact Award** for its work supporting families to create healthier, more energy efficient homes and helping schools and businesses to reduce their carbon footprints.

We're better **supporting Wellington people** to divert waste from landfill with new community partnerships. Our EcoCentre is now a drop-off point not just for e-waste and preloved curtains, but expired and damaged child car seats and preloved bikes. We collected 14 seats for Seat Smart to strip and recycle, and 88 bikes have gone to Rebicycle who refurbish them and give them to families in need.





We're now carbon neutral! Thanks to a partnership with Ekos, we're now offsetting the estimated 43 tonnes of emissions we put into the atmosphere. Our contributions support a South Island rainforest restoration project.

We carried out a record number – nearly 250 of healthy homes assessments for families experiencing health issues as a result of their cold, damp homes through our Warm Fuzzies programme and part in the Well Homes regional partnership.





**Wellington Curtain Bank extended its season by two months to meet demand.** It supported 572 low income families with free, lined curtains for their

With a change in laws for people who are renting out their homes, we developed a new Rental Asset **Report service**. It allows landlords to quickly see if they're up to code or not, and offers solutions. This year we produced a whopping 1206 reports for landlords.





We developed a new school holiday programme which gets kids aged 5 to 12 connected with nature.

The first run of Wilderkids in July sold out, with 175 kids getting up close and muddy in Wellington's Town Belt. It's now a regular programme every school holidays.

We supported Zealandia to reduce their carbon **emissions** with a major project to help them go solar. The panels we installed have generated about 10,500kW hours since September 2016!
